Executive Summary

Johnston County is pleased to present the 2022 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). The CHNA reviews health indicators, gathers community survey results, sets health priorities, and develops action plans to address priority areas. This report provides an overview of the methods and process used to identify and prioritize significant health needs in Johnston County.

Vision Statement

It is with great diligence that Johnston County and its health affiliates present the newest rendition of the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA 2022). We strongly believe that this report and its proposed initiatives will foster a path from which to provide Johnston County residents with services tailored to our communities' most pressing health needs. Through the collaborative efforts of Johnston Health, Johnston County Public Health Department and partners, it is our hope that the information reflected in this report will be utilized to reduce the socioeconomic health burden within Johnston County. Moreover, we hope to bolster the scope and reach of our community outreach endeavors to better aid our underserved residents through efforts encompassing health education, accessibility, affordability, and public services.

The Johnston County CHNA 2022 was collated, evaluated, and established following a bi-sectoral leadership model through UNC Johnston Health and the Johnston County Public Health Department. Contributing leaders, their names, organization, and titles are as follows:

In this report, the aforementioned Johnston County leaders and collaborative partners detail a meaningful evaluation of the predominant health needs across Johnston County to guide planning efforts that will be utilized to address current community necessities. Special attention has been given to the needs of vulnerable populations, unmet health needs or gaps in services, with additional input gathered from current Johnston County residents.

This report will be used to identify and develop actionable ventures from which to provide and connect community members with resources to improve the health challenges intrinsic to their respective regions. The 2022 CHNA was developed through a partnership between Johnston Health, the Johnston County Public Health Department, and Health ENC.

Theoretical Framework/Model

The methods that were utilized to ascertain, and subsequently prioritize, the evolving health needs of Johnston County residents are detailed in Chapter 1 of this report. A synopsis of the data collection methods is as follows:

Following the retrospective analysis of aggregate data from state and national bureaus, significant community health needs were selected and stratified to objectively serve as viable endpoints from which to guide plausible health improvement interventions in Johnston County. Data stratification in this report is firstly delineated through grouping based on data source; i.e., designated primary and secondary datasets originating from resident surveys and university/government institutions, respectively. Subsequently, community variables directly or indirectly associated with barriers to health were extrapolated from the collated datasets and prioritized as a function of our current regional needs and available resources.

The aforementioned prioritization process will enable Johnston County and its institutional partnerships to objectively address and maximize collaborative efforts to ameliorate community health needs within the construct of the various action plans proposed in this report.

Collaborative Process Summary

Health ENC partners began collaborating on the structure of the 2021-2022 CHN primary data survey in October 2020 & finalized the survey in March 2021. Community input was solicited throughout April & May. Primary data was analyzed and secondary data compiled by the Brody School of Medicine and delivered in September of 2021. The JCPHD & Johnston Health then hosted various CHN prioritization-setting discussions with key stakeholders during November 2021, after which a survey was disseminated to all key stakeholders. In January 2022, the JCPHD & Johnston Health held a CHN Priority Discussion in which they analyzed the findings of our priority-setting survey and unanimously finalized the 2021-2022 CHN health priorities for Johnston County. Completion of the CHNA began forthwith and was finalized on April 2022.

Next Steps

The next step in the CHNA process is to develop Community Health Improvement Plans (CHIPs). These plans will include detailed strategies and action plans to address Johnston County's three identified health priorities of Access to Care, Substance Use Disorders and Transportation. The Leadership Team will engage various community partners and community members to determine the best way to address the priorities. The process includes reviewing community assets, reviewing the drivers of community health and selecting a type of strategy. The team will use Results Based Accountability framework to report CHIPs. Community progress on the CHIPs will be reported for the next two years, then another CHNA will be created.

Chapter 1 Introduction

Description of County

Johnston County was established in 1746 and is the 11th largest county in the state. Johnston County Public Health Department is located in Smithfield, the county seat. Johnston Health, the county hospital system, has campuses located in Smithfield and Clayton that provide outpatient, inpatient, and emergency services. Three major highways, I-95, I-40, and highway 70, run through the county which has 11 townships and an estimated population of 209,339 (*US Census Bureau 2019).

The majority of the population is White (77.2%-not Hispanic or Latino), with 16% Black, 2.7% two or more races, and 13.6% Hispanic or Latino. Persons under 18 make up the largest percentage of the population (25.2%), the percent of those over 65 is 13%. (*US Census Bureau 2019).

Retail, manufacturing, agritourism, healthcare, and educational services are the main industries. The top five employers are Johnston County Schools, Johnston Health, Grifols Therapeutics, Johnston County Government, and Asplundh Tree Expert Company.

Johnston County is one of the fastest growing counties in the state and is projected to have the highest percentage growth over the next ten years. This growth has and is leading to county-wide challenges to human service agencies, access to care, schools, and connecting those in rural areas to the more centralized resources.


Overview of Health ENC

Health ENC is a collaborative initiative of health departments and hospitals in eastern North Carolina. The collaborative serves 35 counties with 34 participating health departments and 31 participating hospitals. The collaborative uses a shared approach for primary and secondary data collection to produce a comprehensive Regional Community Health Needs Assessment every three years that can be used to partially satisfy requirements for North Carolina Local Health Department Accreditation and the Internal Revenue Service requirement under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act for charitable hospitals.

Overview of Community Health Needs Assessment Process

The Community Health Needs Assessment Process gathers population health data that county health departments, hospitals, and community groups can use to

- Identify key health needs/issues in eastern North Carolina Communities
- Develop strategies and action plans based upon data aim to improve the quality of life
- Collaborate to maximize results by having a collective impact in the region
- Maintain local control and decision-making about the choice of health priorities and interventions,
- Improve health, partnerships and communication.



Health ENC serves the following counties: Beaufort, Bertie, Bladen, Camden, Carteret, Chowan, Craven, Cumberland, Currituck, Dare, Duplin, Edgecombe, Franklin, Gates, Greene, Halifax, Hertford, Hoke, Hyde, Johnston, Jones, Lenoir, Martin, Nash, Northampton, Onslow, Pamlico, Pasquotank, Pender, Perquimans, Pitt, Sampson, Tyrrell, Washington, and Wayne Counties.

Health Data Sources

Primary Data - Community Survey

Survey Methodology/Design

Health ENC Steering Committee structured the primary data collection for participating health departments and hospitals. The primary data used in the Community Health Needs Assessments included (1) a community survey that could be distributed online or by a paper submission and (2) focus group discussions in some counties. The Health ENC Steering Committee did not encourage focus groups for the 2021-2022 Community Health Needs Assessments because of the global COVID-19 pandemic. However, some counties were able to hold focus group discussions safely despite significant challenges in collecting enough survey responses to accurately represent their community's population.

Survey Design:

The Health ENC Steering Committee developed a primary survey to gather information from community members about their health concerns. A workgroup of Steering Committee members convened and examined survey questions utilized in the 2018-2019 Community Health Needs Assessment. The workgroup also examined data readily available from secondary data sources. The workgroup focused on developing survey questions to obtain data from community members which was not readily available in the secondary data or where secondary data was weak. In addition, workgroup members worked to combine questions where appropriate and to be more inclusive in the wording of response choices. The Steering Committee

reviewed the sample survey questions and made a few additional revisions to assure the survey only contained questions where community input was needed to guide health priority selection and strategic action planning.

Once the survey questions were finalized, the Steering Committee decided on targets for each county. Because the survey was a convenience sample that was being conducted during a global pandemic (COVID-19), each county was asked to complete a minimum of 300 surveys with representation from as many community groups as possible to assure sufficient sampling to represent the full community. The target of 300 surveys per county was identified through previous work with data analysis vendors who examined each county's population and confirmed this number should provide an accurate reflection of the total county's population if responses reflected the population demographics equally.

The surveys were made available to the public from April 1 – June 30, 2021. Surveys were made available in paper format and electronically using the REDcap software. Health ENC partners received feedback throughout the survey period on the age, gender, race/ethnicity, and language of survey respondents to assist them in promoting the surveys to various community members within their counties. At the completion of the survey period, 16,661 English surveys and 502 Spanish surveys were completed. Most counties did not have an equally distributed response to surveys to represent their entire county's population. As a result, survey responses should be considered as only one component of information utilized to select health priorities. The most underserved populations' feedback is not adequately reflected in most surveys. Health ENC partners were encouraged to include key stakeholders, who served these populations, in the health priority selection process to assure many of their clients' health needs were considered.

There were 25 questions on the Johnston County survey. The survey was distributed online and on paper.



- Other health issues, data and resources may be available that were not listed here that communities may wish to consider when establishing health priorities.



Minority Populations




The White population accounts for 77.2% of the total population in Johnston County, with the Black or African American population accounting for 16.0% of the total population. The White population in Johnston County (77.2%) is more than the White population in North Carolina (68.7%) and the Health ENC counties (64.9%). The Black or African American population in Johnston County (16.0%) is less than the Black or African American population in North Carolina (21.4%) and the Health ENC counties (30.0%). The Hispanic or Latino population comprises 13.6% of Johnston County which is significantly higher than North Carolina (9.4%) and Health ENC Counties (9.6%)

Population Growth

- The projected population growth for Johnston County for 2029 is estimated at 259,553 persons
- From 2010 to 2019, the total population of Johnston County has increased by an overall 24%


Age Groups



Overall, Johnston County residents have slightly more children & adolescents (0-14) and middle-aged residents (35-54) than residents of North Carolina and the Health ENC region. The 45-54 age group contains the highest percent of the population at 15.1%, while the 5-14 age group contains the next highest percent of the population at 14.8%, followed by the 35-44 age group at 14.1%. Upper middle aged & senior aged population (55+) is lower than the rest of the state of NC and the ENC counties.

Military/Veteran Populations


Military Population




- The percentage of Military Population in Johnston County is 0.1%
- Compared to the counties in Health ENC (4.8%) and North Carolina (1.1%), Johnston County has a smaller population
- Percent of Military/Veteran population as a whole decreasing across Johnston County, NC, and ENC counties when compared to 2019 statistics.

Veteran Population

The veteran population is given as a percent of the civilian population aged 18 years and older and this data is used for policy analyses, to develop programs, and to create budgets for veteran programs and facilities. Johnston County has a veteran population of 9.3% in 2015-2019, compared to 8.4% for North Carolina and 12.1% for Health ENC counties.



Birth Rates



Birth rates are important measures of population health. The birth rate is usually the dominant factor in determining the rate of population growth; however, population growth is also driven by the age structure of the population (e.g., deaths), immigration and emigration. The Johnston County birth rate demonstrated an overall decrease over the period presented below, with a similar trend seen in the Region and the state.

Johnston County's decreasing trend is to a lesser degree due to a rebound increase in birth rate year over year from 2018-2019.


Analysis of Demographic Data

Johnston County's population by race is majority white (77.2%) followed by similar numbers of black (16 %) and Hispanic (13.6%). The county continues a steady rise in population based on a 2019 total population of 209,339 and a projected increase to 259, 553 in 2029. During the time period represented (approximately 2015-2019), Johnston County has a 10 percent population of veterans as opposed to less than 1 percent of its population serving in the military. Birth rates have slowly trended down during this period meeting with a quick rebound in births during 2018-2019. Birth rate is often seen as an indicator of population health and growth.




Income


Median household income reflects the relative affluence and prosperity of an area. Areas with higher median household incomes are likely to have a greater share of educated residents and lower unemployment rates. Figure 14 shows the median household income in Johnston County (\$59,865), which is slightly higher than the median household income in North Carolina (\$54,602).

The average median household income increased at a 2% higher clip than the state of North Carolina since 2019.

Compared to counties in the Health ENC region Johnston County has a very high median household income. In the region, 32 counties have a lower median household income than Johnston. County.




Poverty



Federal poverty thresholds are set every year by the Census Bureau and vary by size of family and ages of family members. A high poverty rate is both a cause and a consequence of poor economic conditions. Children in poverty are more likely to have physical health problems, behavioral problems and emotional problems. Seniors who live in poverty are an especially vulnerable group due to increased physical limitations, medical needs, and social isolation. Persons with a disability are more likely to live in poverty compared to the rest of the population. Without adequate income, individuals with disabilities may not be able to afford necessary expenses, such as rent or mortgage, utility bills, medical and dental care, and food.

In Johnston County an estimated 13.0% of the population lives below the poverty level, compared to 15.0% of the population in NC and 17.5% for the Health ENC region


The most common racial or ethnic group living below the poverty line in Johnston County, NC is White, followed by Hispanic and Black.

The Census Bureau uses a set of **money income thresholds** that vary by family size and composition to determine who classifies as impoverished. If a family's total income is less than the family's threshold than that family and every individual in it is considered to be living in poverty.



The rate of both children and older adults below the poverty level is slightly lower for Johnston County when compared with N.C. and the Health ENC Counties.




Older Adults in Poverty




 The rate of adults age 65+ years living in poverty is 1.3% lower in Johnston County when compared with NC and the Health ENC counties by 2.5%.

Disabled People in Poverty

The percent of disabled people living in poverty in Johnston County (19%) is slightly lower than the rate for North Carolina (20%).



HousingMedian Monthly Housing Costs



The average household size in Johnston County is 2.82 people per household (owners) and 2.86 people per household (renters), which is slightly higher than the North Carolina value of 2.57 people per household (owners) and for renters (2.43 people per household).

High costs of homeownership with a mortgage can strain both homeowners and the local housing market. This figure shows mortgaged owners median monthly household costs in the Health ENC region. In Johnston County, the median housing costs for homeowners with a mortgage is \$1,277. This is slightly lower than the North Carolina value of \$1,314, and is lower than 8 counties in the Health ENC region.


Gross housing costs have increased across the board since 2019



Median Monthly Household Costs in Johnston County and Surrounding Counties


Severe Housing Problems

- Safe and affordable housing is an essential component of healthy communities, and the effects of housing problems are widespread.
- Housing problems include overcrowding, high housing costs, lack of kitchen, or lack of plumbing facilities
- Slightly more than 13.0% of households in Johnston County have severe housing problems, compared to 15.0% in North Carolina and 16.1%

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is a federal assistance program that provides low-income families with electronic benefit transfers (EBTs) that can be used to purchase food. The goal of the program is to increase food security and reduce hunger by increasing access to nutritious food.


 The percent of households with SNAP benefits in Johnston County is 13%, which is the same as the state value of 13% and 3.7% lower than the Health ENC County region.

Education


Educational Attainment

Graduating from high school is an important personal achievement and is essential for an individual's social and economic advancement. Graduation rates can also be an important indicator of the performance of an educational system. Having a bachelor's degree opens up career opportunities in a variety of fields and is often a prerequisite for higher-paying jobs.

- In Johnston County, the percent of residents 25 or older with a high school degree or higher was lower (86.9%) than the state value (87.8%) but slightly higher the Health ENC region (86.6%)
- Percent with a higher education attainment in Johnston County was lower (22.9%) compared to N.C. (31.3%) but higher than the Health ENC region (22.0%)
- Both levels of education were attained to a higher degree in Johnston County, North Carolina, and ENC counties since 2019.



High School Drop Out Rate




High School Suspension Rate


High school suspension is a form of discipline in which a student is temporarily removed from a classroom and/or school due to a violation of school conduct or code. Higher rates of suspension can be related to high rates of antisocial or delinquent behaviors, which may further contribute to potential future involvement in the juvenile justice system. Additionally, schools with higher suspension rates have higher rates of law or board of education violations and generally spend more money per student.

 Johnston County's rate of high school suspension (9.3 per 100 students) was lower than North Carolina's rate (11.6) and lower than the Health ENC counties (15.5) in 2019-2020 High school dropouts earn less income than high school and college graduates, and are more likely to be unemployed. High school dropouts are generally less healthy and require more medical care. Further, high school dropout rates are linked with heightened criminal activity and incarceration rates, influencing a community's economic, social, and civic health.


- Johnston County's high school dropout rate was 1.1% in 2019-2020, which was lower than the rate in North Carolina (1.5%) and lower than the Health ENC region (1.4%)
- Johnston County's high school dropout rate has been inconsistent over the past four measurement periods







Crime and Safety




Both violent crime and property crime are used as indicators of a community's crime and safety. Violence negatively impacts communities by reducing productivity, decreasing property values and disrupting social services. Violent crime includes four offenses: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

• From 2016 to 2019, the violent crime rate in Johnston County increased from 176.8 to 187.4 but it is still significantly lower than the state average (increased from 375-407.7).

• During the same time period, the property crime rate decreased from 2010.3 to 1489.6, which was lower than the N.C. rate

Juvenile Crime




Youth who commit a crime may not gain the educational credentials necessary to secure employment and succeed later in life. Negative peer influences, history of abuse/neglect, mental health issues, and significant family problems increase the risk of juvenile arrest. The juvenile justice system aims to reduce juvenile delinquency through prevention, intervention, and treatment services.

The undisciplined rate describes juveniles who are unlawfully absent from school, regularly disobedient and beyond disciplinary control of the parent/guardian, are regularly found where it is unlawful for juveniles to be, or have run away from home for more than 24 hours.

- In 2020, the juvenile undisciplined rate in Johnston County (0.42) was lower than the rate in North Carolina (0.97) and the Health ENC region (0.78). This rate is down across the board from 2017-2020.
- In 2020, the juvenile delinquent rate for Johnston County (19.81) was higher than N.C. (18.1) but lower than the Health ENC region (21.4). There was a very large increase in the juvenile delinquent rate in Johnston County from 2017-2020.




According to the U.S. Bureau of Justice Statistics, approximately one out of 100 adults in the U.S. are in jail or prison. Conditions in jails and prisons can lead to an increased risk of infectious diseases such as tuberculosis and hepatitis C, as well as assault from other inmates. After incarceration, individuals are likely to face a variety of social issues such as employment discrimination, disruption of family relationships and recidivism.

- Over the past four measurement periods, the incarceration rate in Johnston County has decreased
- In 2019-2020, the incarceration rate in Johnston County was lower (300.9 per 1,000 population) than N.C. (304.2) and the Health ENC region (345.2)
- ENC region made a significant jump in its incarceration rate, jumping the state of NC as the leader.

Child abuse includes physical, sexual, and emotional abuse. All types of child abuse and neglect can have long lasting effects throughout life, damaging a child's sense of self, ability to have healthy relationships, and ability to function at home, at work, and at school.

 The 2018 child abuse rate in Johnston County was lower (6.1 per 1,000 pop.) than N.C. (8.0 per 1,000 pop.) and the Health ENC (8.8).





Exercising the right to vote allows a community to choose elected officials and hold them accountable. Voting ensures that all citizens have the opportunity to voice their opinions on issues such as the use of tax dollars, civil rights and foreign policy. By voting, individuals shape their communities and influence the next generation of society. A high level of voter turnout indicates that citizens are involved and interested in who represents them in the political system.

 Johnston County has a lower percent of residents of voting age (74.3%) than North Carolina (77.6%) and the Health ENC Counties (77.1%)

Analysis of Socioeconomic Profile


These drivers of health all contribute to the overall wellbeing of the health of Johnston County. Socioeconomics refers to the relationship between a group of people and their surroundings. This includes things like Income, Education and Employment, Poverty, Housing, Food insecurities and Transportation. These things influence one another. For example, the high school dropout rate (1.1%), is lower than the state or health ENC counties which creates access to better paying jobs, and in turn makes the median household income higher than that of the state and health ENC counties. The median household income in Johnston County is \$59,865. However, there is still 13% of the Johnston County population that live in poverty. Without adequate income, housing and food insecurities can occur. This can negatively affect the physical, social, and emotional health of both children and adults. Transportation is also a driving factor in being able to have adequate income, which determines the ability to provide things like safe housing and nutritious foods. Johnston County has a lower percentage (.2%) of persons who drive alone to work or who use public transportation. Because it is a rural county, public transportation is not offered, and walking is not accessible. The employment rate is negatively affected by lack of transportation. Overall Johnston County is one of the least distressed counties in North Carolina, but there are still many things to do to improve the health of the overall community.


Health Insurance Coverage

Medical costs in the United States are very high. People without health insurance may not be able to afford medical treatment or prescription drugs. They are also less likely to get routine checkups and screenings, so if they do become ill they may not seek treatment until the condition is more advanced, and therefore more difficult and costly to treat.

- Nearly 14% of the population 0-64 years of age in Johnston County are uninsured
- The rate of individuals aged 0-64 years old that have health insurance coverage in Johnston County was 86.4%, which was lower than the rate for North Carolina (87.3%) and the Health ENC region (87.0%)




Government Health Insurance Only Coverage – Medicaid, Medicare, Tricare

Access to primary care is necessary to improving the health outcomes of communities. With the recent spread of the novel <u>coronavirus</u> in North Carolina, primary care is critical as an entry-point to further care. Many rural areas of North Carolina lack adequate access to primary care providers. The disparities in access between rural and metropolitan areas have continued to grow despite an overall increase of physicians in NC.


On the map above, if a County is shaded in green, it indicates the county is meeting the NC Institute of Medicine's (NCIOM) target ratio of 1 primary care provider to every 1,500 people.

Johnston County is orange, and therefore, does not meet the NC Institute of Medicine's (NCIOM) target ratio of 1 primary care provider to every 1,500 people.

Currently, 60% of NC's 100 counties meet the NCIOM's target. As shown in this figure, seven counties were substantially below target: Anson, **Northampton, Franklin, Warren, Gates, Tyrrell** and **Camden**. **Camden** has a population of just over 10,000, and no primary care providers.

The NCIOM definition of primary care clinician includes physicians, nurse practitioners (NPs), physician assistants (PAs) and certified nurse midwives (CNMs).

As shown in this figure, the number of physicians per 10,000 population Johnston County has increased from 6.97 physicians in 2000 to 7.28 in 2019 which is below the state rate of 24.3 per 10,000 population.

Analysis of Clinical Care Profile

Access to care is a priority that Johnston County has been working on for many years. Improving health outcomes is dependent on increasing access to care. Access to healthcare is influenced by the number of providers available in a given area, healthcare coverage, and accessibility. The NCIOM recommends 1 provider per every 1,500 persons. Johnston County is not meeting that target. 7.28 providers per 10,000 people is the current rate of primary care providers in Johnston County. Increasing the number of providers (MD's, Nurse Practitioners, Physician Assistants, and Behavioral health providers) could decrease the number of emergency department visits. Having more providers would increase the number of persons receiving evidence based preventive healthcare. Health insurance rates directly affect the percentage of persons receiving preventive care. The percentage of persons with health insurance in Johnston County (86.4%) is less than that of the state and health ENC counties. However, 13.9% of persons receive Medicaid which is slightly higher than the state rate. Without health insurance persons are less likely to access healthcare services. Increasing health insurance rates, number of providers and making healthcare more accessible will improve the overall health of the Johnston County community.



Analysis of Chronic and Communicable Disease Profile

Cancer has succeeded heart disease as the leading cause of death in Johnston County and North Carolina. However, in ENC counties heart disease is still the leading cause. Alzheimer's disease is the fourth cause of death in Johnston County despite having less elderly population. The leading cause of injury death is motor vehicle traffic. The leading cause of emergency visits and hospitalizations are falls, followed by motor vehicle traffic. Chlamydia is the highest reported communicable disease, followed by Hepatitis C and gonorrhea.







Chapter 10 Community Prioritization Process

JCPHD & Johnston Health complied a summary of all secondary & primary data into a CHNA priority setting PowerPoint which was then presented to various community stakeholders. These stakeholders include: The Johnston Health Board of Directors, Johnston County Housing Think Tank (NC Community Action Association), Johnston County Board of Health, Johnston County Safety Net, Johnston County Faith Network and Johnston County Opioid Taskforce. After each priority setting presentation, a survey was sent out to all participants allowing them to individually prioritize each of our key findings. Previously, these discussions and prioritization activities would have been conducted in person, but due to COVID-19 restrictions were held via teleconference & SurveyMonkey. Taking into consideration key stakeholder feedback & properly weighing secondary data sources, the JCPHD & Johnston Heath unanimously voted to adopt the following three health priorities for the 2021-2022 CHNA.

- 1. Access to Care
- 2. Substance Use Disorders
- 3. Transportation










